meaning behind them. Understanding these colors is a way we can all help families and children with special health needs navigate a night of trick-ortreating with less stress, more patience, and a lot more fun!

<u>Blue</u>

A blue pumpkin bucket may signify that a child is on the autism spectrum. These trick-or-treaters might not be able to make eye contact, say "Trick or treat," or tolerate wearing a costume. Be kind and patient to all who want to participate in the fun!

<u>Purple</u>

Purple pumpkin buckets can mean that a child is suffering from epilepsy. They may be sensitive to strobes, flickering and flashing lights that are often used in decorating for Halloween. It is important to have an easy way to quickly turn these features off.

<u>Teal</u>

If a child has a teal pumpkin bucket, it can mean that they are suffering from food allergies. It's always a good idea to keep a few non-food treats like stickers, pencils, bubbles, or glow sticks handy to ensure every child is included.

Fireplace Safety

While a fireplace adds warmth and comfort to a home during the colder months, safety should always be top of mind. Check out these tips to learn how to work and maintain your fireplace:

- Have your chimney professionally cleaned and inspected on an annual basis, especially if you use a wood burning fireplace.
- Open the chimney flue prior to starting a fire to allow fresh air to feed flames and smoke to exit.
- Fireplaces should not be used as furnaces. Use them for a short time no longer than 5 hours.
- Don't burn paper or use any kind of combustible liquid in your fireplace.
- During the holidays, keep the area surrounding the fireplace free from flammable objects like decorations or stockings.
- After the last fire of the season, clean out the firebox and remove all of the ash so it won't damage the masonry in the firebox during the off season.
